Back in our midwinter issue last January, Peter Wicks announced that he was planning to create a new Hedding directory, since it has been several years (over ten, by our reckoning) since the last one, basically a phone list, was published. He sent out a PDF form to those who had signed up to be listed in the new directory; the response was nowhere near sufficient to make the publication useful to anyone.

We think this is a really good idea, for all the reasons Peter listed in his original article. He's still willing to do it, if enough people sign up. Here's an excerpt from his article in the midwinter *Highlights*. Please note the sentences in italics if you're concerned about privacy and security:

As it has been quite a few years since the last telephone directory was published, and cell numbers are now able to be transferred throughout different carriers, I am willing to create a new one.

The listing I am thinking of creating would include: last name, first name, cell number, (and whether or not you can accept text messages), Hedding and main residence landline numbers, (if still using), a personal email address if you have one, and any comments or other information you would like published with this list. Every field is optional to submit for publication in the directory. This would be distributed only to those who submit their information. They must be affiliated with Hedding Campground in some way. I have felt for some time that this directory could be invaluable to the Trustees, Winter Security personnel and in situations where a neighbor needs to get in touch for safety reasons, not to mention the possibility of needing to do contact tracing, like last year.

If you are interested in participating, please email a request for a form to be filled out and submitted to me at heddingdirectory@gmail.com. Please put your full name in the subject line so I know it is not spam mail. Once I have created the PDF form, I will email it out to everyone who signed up, to complete all information you would like to be in the directory and then to email back to me. I would try to have the directory completed and distributed before the April opening of camp.

EXCERPTS OF HEDDING HISTORY BY JAMES A. ROBERTSON, HISTORIAN

A committee was sent from the Dover District camp meeting of 1862 at South Newmarket to look over the property of Ezra Barber at Epping as a potential location for their camp meetings. They liked what they saw and the process was started to buy and prepare the grounds for the 1863 camp meeting.

An article in the Portland *Daily Press* on August 10, 1869 by "Steve", a correspondent of theirs, gives further details which made sense as time passed.

A shrewd presiding elder, Rev. Albert G. Manson, went to the Concord and Portsmouth Railroad and told them that he knew of a place suitable for a camp meeting at Epping and that he could probably convince them to buy it. Rev. Manson suggested that he could pay for half the purchase price of the land and the railroad the other half.

The C & P Railroad considered the number of passengers they had been carrying to the meetings at South Newmarket and the number of Boston & Maine passengers who would have to transfer to their railroad for those last few miles to East Epping station and agreed to the deal. Over the years the C&P made many times the cost of the land in ticket sales.

This Portland *Press* article fills in some of the blanks in our history. Rev. Calvin Holman was the presiding elder in 1862 and did much of the leg work in the purchase of the lots, but Rev. Manson, the p.e. in 1863, did the actual transaction. Rev. Manson preached at the camp meeting and may have been on the search committee. The deeds were made out to him and sold to the HCMA in 1864 after Hedding was fully organized and incorporated.

The price of a railroad ticket to the camp meeting was half fare for the round trip plus five cents. Railroads and camp meetings were a good match, with the camp providing crowds of people not likely to tear up the railroads' cars and all going to one destination. Get away from New England and the railroads weren't usually as generous as half fare and weren't as apt to put on extra trains or cars, and I know of no other that charged "plus five cents".

The five cents added to each ticket was the Concord and Portsmouth's way of showing appreciation for the kindness of Rev. Manson. Each year the C&P made a donation to Hedding from the sale of camp meeting tickets. The practice was continued until 1910 by the Boston & Maine Railroad, lessor of the C&P Railroad.

From the Trustees

Reference Library: As chairman for the past four years, I have had many people ask me questions about the rules and regulations at Hedding and the history of those rules. I have spent many hours reading over notes from Annual Meetings, which is where the rules are typically made. I have the luxury of having access to read these reports out of what is known as the "secretaries' book." The current secretaries' book has the annual meeting notes from 1988 to present. There are previous books, stored in a safe, that have annual meeting notes going back to the early 1900s (which are fascinating to read). All of this got me to thinking, that while the annual meeting notes are made available to everyone, I doubt that many read them and even fewer save copies of them to refer to later.

These annual reports, along with the financial statement books published every year, contain vital infor-

mation that needs to be preserved and available to everyone. To that end, I want to create a Hedding Documents reference section in our Library. The reference section would contain Annual Reports and Financial Statement Books as well as a copy of our constitution and rules and regulations.

Please let me know if you have past copies of any annual reports at your cottage, that I could borrow and copy. (While the sectaries' book has copies, it is a hard back book, and the pages are pasted in the book, which make it very difficult to make copies from). Also, I am looking for extra copies of the financial statement books if you are willing to donate them to be placed in the Library.
