It's been a good week at Hedding: the most successful Fair ever, a great Day Camp show, and a Camp Meeting led by a truly inspiring preacher. Day Camp is done, the Annual Meeting will be history in another day, and the summer comes crashing to a close — prematurely, it always seems. Yes, there are other weekend events coming up, but the "big stuff" is done, and Hedding in mid-August suddenly takes on the same quiet that we all experience when we visit in the off-season.

We've said it before in this space, and others have expressed the same sentiments: the season at Hedding ends too early, ostensibly because public schools open earlier than they used to and people are worried about attendance and participation in various events if they happen too late in the season. Some fear that no one would attend Camp Meeting if it began now, in mid-August, as it used to, rather than the day after the Fair and Day Camp show — events which, if memory serves, were also a week apart until a few years ago.

Maybe six weeks of Day Camp is all that's practical, for any number of reasons. Fair enough. But why jam Camp Meeting into that last week? If the reason is purely fear of low attendance, we ask the Trustees, or the Religious Life Committee, or some other body, to take a careful survey of every household on the campground, to determine how many people would *really* not be here if Camp Meeting and the Annual Meeting were pushed back to a mid-month start. *We're willing to bet that the number would be small.*

## EXCERPTS OF HEDDING HISTORY

On Saturday August 25, 1917, the eight-day camp meeting was winding down — or was it building to a fever pitch? The annual meeting we conduct on Saturday had been held at 4 p.m. on Tuesday, to hear the nominating committee report, and again on Thursday, to conduct all other business. That Saturday a Love Feast was led by Rev. William Woods at 7:30 a.m., followed in succession by a lecture on "Adults in the Sunday School" by Rev. Dr. H. C. Wilson of Chicago at 9:30, a preaching service at 10:30 by Rev. L. J. Morse, a pentecostal service at 1:30 p.m. by Rev. H. W. Hook, and a children's service by Miss Halford. Dr. Milton S. Rees, the camp meeting speaker and a nationally known evangelist, preached at 2:45, followed by a recreation period. The twilight service was held at Vincent Rock at 6:30, and the evening service, with Dr. Rees at, 7:45. The closing Sunday began with Rev. Otis Cole conducting a prayer meeting at 9:30 and morning worship with Dr. Rees at 10:30. The Pentecostal and children's services were held at 1:30, with an address at 2:45 by Mr. Van Tassel of Boston. Naturally there was no recreation period because it was Sunday. The Twilight service at 6:30 and the closing evangelistic service at 7:30 with Dr. Rees ended the week.

There were a couple of alterations to the program due to the crowd of thousands (plural) reported in the Boston Post, Lawrence Tribune and Portsmouth Times. Because of their popularity, the Pentecostal services outgrew the Haverhill House and had to be moved to Chautauqua Hall, and some services with Dr. Rees had to be moved from Chautauqua Hall to the auditorium in Public Circle. Oh, that we should have that problem today! Should we not try to fill the seats at the closing services of the 2017 camp meeting? The messages from a loving God to His people are just as important for us to hear as they were for our ancestors at the 1917 camp meeting.


