EXCERPTS OF HEDDING HISTORY BY JAMES A. ROBERTSON, HISTORIAN

The Foster's Democrat of Dover had a complaint in the August 30, 1873 issue about the Hedding camp meeting causing the trains from Manchester and Concord to run late. "The only objection we have to such things is the botheration [sic] of the mail trains on the railroad." Due to the hundreds of passengers at about 15 stations and unloaded at East Epping, the train would miss its connection with the Boston & Maine train at South Newmarket Junction. "Consequently, we get neither business communications nor news from the central portion of the state in season to be of much advantage." The mail would be along on the next eastbound B&M train shortly.

This was a problem of short duration because camp meeting was only one week and the half-fare tickets that year were only good from August 23 - 31.

Mention was made in another paper that one evening the train left the East Epping station at 7 p.m. With 16 loaded cars and took until 10 p.m. to distribute the passengers at each station on its way to Concord.

Our complainer does admit: "Perhaps his camp meeting is of more importance than all other interests put together just now."

Good news for Hedding


